CASI Scholarship Fund Continue to Grow

Just a little over a year ago the CASI Scholarship Fund was created. Since then the enthusiasm and support of this fund has continued to grow at a steady pace. One of our pods that has become a strong supporter of the scholarship fund is the San Antonio Pod. A year ago they contributed \$2,500.00 and this year they have come through with another \$2,000.00 donation. In the corresponding picture you see Jim Stateczny, CASI Treasurer, presenting Sue Ann Greive, SAP-CASI Great Pepper, a CASI Corporate Membership Plaque in appreciation of their continued support. CASI at the annual Texas Folklife Festival, SAP-CASI's annual fund raiser. But you know, SAP-CASI is not the only contributor to the CASI Scholarship Fund, and I would like to recognize a few of them now.

Over the last year some other CASI Pods have contributed to the scholarship fund with funds raised by holding chili cookoffs, raffles, etc. The following pods have contributed to the CASI Scholarship Fund in 2001:

Tall in Texas Pod-\$659.00 Piedmont Pepper Pod (In memory of Alex McAuley)-\$1,560.00 Pod of the Perdenales -\$400.00 North of the Brazos Pod - \$720.00 Texas Hill Country Pod-\$364.00 VASA Pod -\$800.00 San Angelo Cookers Association - \$1,013.00 Houston Pod (excess funds from Great Peppers Meeting) - \$3,000.00

This year at TICC, Don and Suzie Weber made and sold necklaces made from beads and raised \$431.00. Jimmy Taylor, third place winner in the Salsa competition at TICC, contributed his \$300.00 prize money. Justin Hobbs, the artist that created this year and last years TICC posters, contributed \$215.00. And at the conclusion of this year's TICC, the Confederate Air Force contributed \$500.00 to the CASI Scholarship Fund.

These are by no means all of the contributors to the CASI Scholarship Fund, but they do demonstrate the spirit that will insure that this fund will be a success for many years to

If you have a cook-off coming up in the month <u>March</u> it must be received by the 15th of January to meet the 30 day advertising requirement come. In May of 2001 CASI awarded three scholarships (one thousand dollars a year for four years) and in May of 2002 we expect to do the same. As support continues to grow we hope to be able to continue to help graduating high school seniors for many years to come.



The Olympic Torch Through Austin

Works cannot express the honor associated with seeing the flame, let alone being one of the torchbearers for this year's trek from Atlanta to the Salt Lake City 2002 Olympic Games. The memories of the 2001 TICC are still clear in our minds...Randy Moore winning the TICC "Best of the Best" pepper trophy for this year.... 170-plus women toasting with Tequila Rose.... new friendships... and old ones renewed...and a toast to our departed friends. But as I sat around the campfire in Terlingua, someone asked me who I thought was the best chili cook that I ever competed against. If I had a chance to cook against the best, whom would I want to invite to the party? The tequila bottle was then passed to me, and I never got a chance to answer the person. I did not think of the question again until I was in the middle of my 24-hour trip back to Tennessee from Terlingua.

Johnye Harriman produced "The Unofficial CASI Book of Lists" for the 2001 Great Pepper's meeting, and I viewed the list of winners for TICC and played around with the listing of who were the most consistent people who had placed at TICC. Each of us has favorite cooks who we enjoy competing against. Maybe this is the time, as I have just done, for you to make your own list and tell these cooks that you enjoy their friendship and their competitive drive to be one of the best.

CASI NATIONAL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

CASI is on course to continue a true national charity - our National Scholarship Program. "Making a difference through chili" became real at the 2000 Great Peppers Meeting in Denver, Colorado, when the CASI Board of Directors presented the concept of a National Scholarship Program. The Great Peppers approved the plan with a unanimous vote!

Graduating seniors from high schools all over the U.S. were able to apply for a CASI scholarship. Prior to Jan. 1, 2002, all CASI Pods will be provided with application forms, and a prospective applicant can secure an application from the nearest Pod - or from any Pod for that matter. The same dedicated Scholarship Committee will serve again to review the applications and recommend the recipients: Hut Brown, Chair of the Committee; Dan Bauer-Virginia; Trudy Berry-Arizona; Bobby Elliott-West Texas; Garnier Albus-Northwest

Texas; Pat King-Central Texas; Pat Krenek-South Texas; Preston Nickle-South; Fred Roycroft-Pacific Northwest; and Harvey West-North Texas.

Applicants will have their Grade Point Average verified on the application by an official at their high school or institution. Also required is a 250-word narrative on their high school and community accomplishments, along with their career plans and goals for the future. Finally, applicants will take the completed material to the Great Pepper of a CASIPod, WHO WILL INDICATE SPONSORSHIP BY SIGNING THE APPLICATION.

At the CASI Board Meeting in February in Irving, the CASI Board of Directors will determine how many scholarships may be awarded and the amount of each scholarship. In all likelihood, there will probably be three (3) new \$1,000.00 a year (for four years) scholarships awarded. Applications will be due to the Committee Chair by FEBRUARY 1, 2002, and recipients will be notified early in April 2002.

The Chili Frontier

Starting a new chili cookoff in an area where chili is only known as a item on a restaurant menu is a long term project. Like any other cookoff, you have to find a location first. A non-profit service organization is normally receptive in listening to ideas that will help them raise money for their organization. American Legions, VFW's, Elks Lodges, Moose Lodges, etc always have events to raise money. They are a great source of information about the community and the area. Non-profit organizations have two types of members those that talk about all the things the organization does and others that do all the work. It takes time to find the 3% that do the work and you need them involved with the cookoff. I have thought I had the right people, only to find out as we go along that I didn't. Needless to say, the less they do, the more you do to make the cookoff successful. It is about making the cookoff successful for CASI, recruiting new cooks, generating positive publicity, creating interest for future cookoffs in the area. The first cookoff is always difficult so just accept that because the second one will be much better. Membership organizations have a way of sitting back and watching - hell they want to be able to say they didn't have anything to do with it in case it fails. But, they sure will jump on the wagon saying they knew it would be a good deal when it is over and they made some money. Keep in mind that what they call a successful event compared to you will be different as it relates to a chili cookoff. Your standard for a successful cookoff is much higher than theirs usually. Some measure success by seeing all the bar stools filled the day of the event - some by all the new faces they have not seen in a long time (members that do not come around much as they are tired of the same old stuff going on), some by all the positive PR leading up to the event (if you do this in the community), some by the "hamburgers" they sold during the day and it goes on. You take that along with say \$500.00 their charity will receive - CASI hit a home run!!!!!. The members often belong to other organizations in the area and they will be talking about "our chili cookoff"

Now that a location has been found, setting the cookoff date is important. The date should be a minimum of 8 months out and to have some breathing room, I recommend a year. You need the time because other than the normal tasks of getting ready for a cookoff – we also need to find cooks!!!!!! Trust me, 15 is a big number in some parts of the USA even if it is the only CASI cookoff within 400 miles area.

In next months Terlingua Trails – we will get started on this cookoff in the CHILI FRON-TIER.


