## Don Reed Succumbs

## After Long Bout With Cancer

Donald Ray Reed, Sr. was born August 28, 1936, in Mansfield, Texas, to Mary B. and Bennie R. Reed. Survived by wife Maxine Melton Reed, daughter Cynthia Ann Reed of Houston, Texas, son Donald Ray Reed, Jr., daughter-in-law Monica Reed and grandson Anthony Austin Ray Reed of Castle Rock, Colorado and mother Mary B. Reed of Waco, Texas. He moved with his parents to Waco, Texas at the age of one where he lived until graduation from Baylor University in 1958 , receiving a commission as ${ }^{2 n d}$ Lieutenant in the United States Air Force.

He served 28 years in the Air Force including 2 years in the Office of Auditor General, 15 years as a Radar Navigator on a B-52 crew flying over 100 combat missions in Southern Asia. He held staff positions at Barksdale Air Force Base in Bossier City, Louisiana and at Strategic Air Command Headquarters at Offut Air Force Base in Omaha, Nebraska. He served as liaison for B-52 combat forces in the Republic of Korea. He held rank of Lieutenant Colonel upon retirement at Carswell Air Force Base in Fort Worth, Texas, in February, 1987. During his career, he was awarded 31 metals for Distinguished Service, Achievement and Valor.

It has been said that as one takes their final breath their entire life passes before them, at which time a feeling of restful satisfaction occurs when one realizes that they did make a diffe

ence with the time they were given to spend on this earth. This lasting impact can be made with family, community, country, and friends. In Don's case I believe that he can check "all of the above". Don loved cooking chili, and most of all I believe he enjoyed watching his wife and daughter win with great regularity. It could be said that Don retired into chili. For after he retired, and especially after selling their house and moving into their motorhome, Don and Maxine became regular attendees at chili cookoffs allover the United States. Their daughter Cindy, who is currently serving as a CASI Director, holds the distinct honor of being the only person to have won back to back TICC Championships. And finally, on a personal note, how many of us have experienced Don exclaiming "hello darling" as he picked up the domino that would certainly send you digging deep into our wallets?

As we all say our final farewells to our departed friend let us be thankful for the time he shared with each of us and the good that came from his friendship. Personally, I know that I am a better person for having known the one and only Donald Ray Reed, Sr.

## President's Message

Recently a question was sent by e-mail from Coby Davis to the attention of all Great Peppers. He is concerned with the method of allowing the CASI Board to elect positions within the Board; i.e. President, Secretary, etc. Coby suggests a By-Laws change allowing the Great Peppers to elect those positions.

Mike Strack responded to this question with what I would say is the simple truth of the matter. Each year CASI faces a challenge to fill Director positions with members that are first willing to run for the position, and second, qualified to fill the position of Director. As time passes we will continue to face this challenge, and it will become more difficult in the future. CASI has grown significantly in recent years and holding the position of Director is not as easy as it appears at times. Directors, along with many others, are responsible for TICC's success each year and for the most part are working all year to see it is a success. The positions held within the Board are very important to those serving, and the election of those positions within the Board is taken very seriously.

Each year during the Great Peppers' Meeting, those running for election to the Board are fully aware of positions within the Board that may be open due to the Director holding that position deciding not to run or being defeated during the election. It is hoped that anyone deciding to run for the position of Director seriously considers what he or she can bring to the entire Board, as well as to CASI as an organization. As Mike stated, electing Directors by the Great Peppers and then allowing the Board to elect positions within itself has worked very well over the years and allows the Board to fill those positions with the best person for the job at the time. There are some members that are not always satisfied at times with what Director holds a particular position on the Board, but it sure doesn't mean we need to change the method we are now using. The simple fact is the present method has worked well for many years without any big problems and that speaks for itself. Allowing 60-70 members to select the Board positions instead of 11 could create problems we don't need. It's not broke; don't try to fix it.

The State Police Headquarters in Austin is responsible for what happens on the roads during TICC. Brewster County has no control over this situation and has voiced their concerns about what goes on, but for the most part to no avail.

Let me assure everyone, $90 \%$ of all tickets written (and there are a lot of them) are warnings to the driver. I would suggest any attempt to build a case of harassment against the State Police would result in many more paying tickets, not receiving warnings. I realize many of the reasons for stopping cars during TICC are petty, but rest assured, little if anything can be done to prevent them. I strongly suggest that your vehicle be in proper working order before making the trip to South Brewster County, and reduce your chances of getting stopped by keeping your driving on the roads to a minimum. Reducing the reasons for getting stopped could become the reason for the State reducing their presence during TICC.

## Please Mister Postman Bring me my Terlingua Trails

As most of you are probably aware of by now, the monthly arrival of your Terlingua Trails is taking longer and longer. The January issue of the Terlingua Trails was delivered to the Post Office, in Tucson Arizona, on December 28, 2001. My copy of the Terlingua Trails just arrived at my office a few minutes ago, and today is January 17, 2002. We started experiencing this delivery problem some eight months ago, and quite frankly folks I don't know how to fix it. At the present time we are mailing the paper third class bulk. We have also gone to the trouble of bar coding your address which is supposed to speed up delivery. As the Sun starts to inch its way back into the Northern Hemisphere, that is the indicator that it will soon be time to start thinking about cutting the grass and other outdoor activities, such as once again cooking chili.

Oh, yes, let me not forget the Wedding Anniversary of Ole Harry T \& Bess ...... and believe it or not, this is one date I do remember - February 16th. This year will be 40 years of marriage, and I just realized that 19 of those 40 years have been involved with CASI and cooking chili.

Bess and I have seen many changes in the "World of Chili Cooking" in the last 19 years. This past November while we were in Terlingua, we noticed that one of the quilts that the Terlingua School was selling raffle tickets for had squares or blocks of the quilt made from the front \& back logos of T-shirts from past chili cookoffs.

An old saying comes to my mind from an early cigarette commercial, "I Would Walk a Mile for a Camel" ............Well, I don't know so much about Walking a Mile for a Camel, but I know that Bess and I have driven many a mile for a t-shirt or a goodie bag, and numerous times that was all we came home with.

I used to look forward to the Mailman arriving because it meant that along with the bills, there would be 2 or 3 flyers announcing upcoming chili cookoffs somewhere, and on the bottom of the flyer would be a Pre-Registration Form with a deadline date and shirt size to check and return before a set date to receive a t-shirt when you arrived at the cookoff.

Pre-Registration is slowly going by the way side; many cooks today do not know if they are going to attend until a day or two before ..........and with some... not until the day of the cookoff. But in the past, you sent it in to make sure you got the $t$-shirt because you knew that you would be there...........and if the Pre-Registration mentioned a GOODIE BAG, you made DAMN sure you got it back in on time!

Back in those days, t-shirts and goodie bags meant as much or more than points. Don't get me wrong, the points were important....but when all was said and done and the points went elsewhere...that $t$-shirt and goodie bag always made the ride home a little more pleasant.

Between the $t$-shirts, goodie bags, cooking chili and meeting and making new friends, it didn't take long for us to become "Road Cooks". The early days of Road Cooking were not easy......as many of you know. Places like Shamrock, TX, Munster, TX, Clinton, OK and many more. Regardless of where the cookoff was, it seemed like a Million Miles from Lamar, MO but we went on a shoestring for a budget.

After a few cookoffs on the road, we found out about something new ...... it was called a Cooks Party; not all cookoffs had one, but if they did that was sweet music to our ears. Regardless of the location of the cookoff, Bess would always try to take off from work early that day and have things ready to go when I got off work. We would always try hard to make it to the cookoff town in time to get something to eat at the Cooks Party. The only time we stopped was for fuel, and if the gas stop had the fixings for a sandwich, we got it.......and if they didn't and we missed the Cooks Party, we always hoped that maybe there would also be a BBQ cookoff the next day and we could get samples.

Some of today's cookoffs offer on-site overnight camping
with and without hookups. RV's \& Motorhomes were very few and far between when we started cooking and traveling...........overnight camping meant sleeping in a tent or in the back of a pickup truck or the front seat of a car.

Chili has changed also. In the past you could judge or taste 25 chilies and get 25 different tastes .........today you can taste 25 chilies and get a similar taste to each. Which brings to mind something that the late TICC Champion Bobby Aldridge told me at The Great Peppers Meeting in Las Cruces, NM several years. Bess and I were new to competition cooking and eager to learn and willing to try about anything to get on a winning trail and weren't having much success.

It is still as clear in my mind as if it were yesterday. I asked Bobby, "What can Dixie \& I do to win \& be a champion like you?"

Bobby hesitated a moment, took a puff off his cigarette, and looking over the top of his glasses replied....."Do your best and be yourselves. If I told you I used peanut butter in my chili and someone overheard it........the next thing you know, everyone is using peanut butter."

That was in 1988 and Dixie and I have tried to live by that; not only in our chili cooking, but also in our daily lives.

Christmas and New Year's brought a new house and along with that a new stove which needed a new skillet to make things all match. So, I went shopping. Bed Bath and Beyond was as good as any place to get serious about a quality investment. Skillet in hand, I began to notice all the different types of cooking pots that were available. This prompted me to get out a pad and pen and start taking notes for an article...this one.

To start, no two chili cooks will ever agree on which pot is the best pot in which to cook. So I know there is going to be some controversy stirred up here.

What I have learned from 18 years on the trail is that cooking chili each weekend is basically a chemistry experiment. A good chemist, like a good cook, has to be consistent with their formulas (recipes). Also like a good chemist needing the best glassware and tools, a good cook has to have the finest cookware they can obtain to help maintain consistency. Sure, you can cook just about anything in a cheap pot, but the cheap pot does not offer a great deal of the necessary elements that allow a cook to be consistent from one cookoff to another. As we get into this a bit, I will name some brands and explain some good and bad features of several brands.

To begin, never use a pure aluminum pot. It has been proven that the tomato sauce will react with the aluminum and some bad effects happen to humans from consuming the cooked food. The cooking utensil industry got around that by coating the aluminum with Teflon or other tough skinned coatings that sealed the aluminum from the food.

Why alumimum to start? It was lightweight and carried (distributed) heat well.

While we are on the subject of metal, why is the oldfashioned cast iron pot not a good utensil in which to cook chili? Well cast iron may look and feel hard, but it will absorb moisture and odors. This poor old cooking pot was used for a lot of things and woe be to the poor family who only had one pot to use for everything. Can you imagine cooking a pot of stew after grandma had cooked up a bunch of her lard and lye soap? The same holds true today - don't fry fish on Friday night and expect to cook chili in the same pot on Saturday morning.

I won't make this monthly column just about cooking pots or recipes, but for a few of the installments I will labor on the subject of what makes a good cooking pot really great. Then I will try to throw in a few hints about what is new and novel to try that I've seen on the trail.

I will invite everyone to contribute to my knowledge pool, as I am not an authority on chili cooking...anyone would be a damn fool to think they really were. Write to me by e-mail at tejasmed @evl.net. See you on the trail.

Our Last Christmas-CASA

Boy, I hardly know how to start. Estraella Mountain Indian School where Lori Caradori has worked as a teacher for 20 years has closed. It's sort of depressing...especially for Lori. The only good side is that as a Pod we'll be open for new ideas when next Christmas comes around. But for now, Lori would like to thank everyone who has helped, and in some cases helped a lot over the past several years.

For my part I would like to write a little history as to what our Pod has with regard to Christmas and kids. If memory serves me correctly (which it may not so don't anyone get too offended), this story begins with Sharren Christopherson. About 12 years ago she brought Christmas "stars" with names and descriptions of kids to a Pod meeting. In another year or so someone spoke up, and we voted to adopt a family. At first we did this through the Salvation Army. I think we did a good job of collecting "Christmas stuff" and for a few years, Kim and Kevin Schoenradt took truckloads of "stuff" to the Army. This scenario was accomplished anonymously, with no one knowing who actually received our contributions. I guess not meeting or seeing the recipients was pretty emotionally isolating to some of our Pod members.
When June Roberts got involved, she knew how to screen people in need and we were soon able to start selecting our own families. Our Christmas program really started to happen and became, at least for some of us, a bit more personal. My turn to be touched came when Sharren and I delivered the Pod's "Christmas stuff "to a trailer park in Mesa. As I drove through the park, kids raced and bounced with excitement. They knew someone was coming, but as there were so many without very much, they were not sure for whom I was looking. Many if not most of the families would reasonably qualify for some sort of help. Anyway, my truck was packed to the brim and Sharren arrived a couple minutes later with her truck in a similar state. The kids who were our recipients, as well as a dozen or so neighbor kids, all helped unload the trucks. The Pod provided an abundance of "stuff" for several families. The lady to whom we officially gave this "stuff" told us that other families were hoping for a similar Christmas and that if the other
organizations didn't come through, there was plenty to share.
Some years later, Lori apparently thought "why not the kids at her own school"? The first year our Pod gave to Estraella Mountain Indian School, Sharren, Lori and I took "Christmas stuff" to a family who had a parent recently die. By the second year, the Pod had adopted a whole class. By the year 2000, our participation had grown to the point that we had adopted grades $K$ through 3 , as well as the Special Ed students. When I say we, I want to include resources outside of the Pod.
Roland Regeon and Sharren, for example, solicited many of their workmates to participate. Former member Kathy Weitzel still participates and adopts a whole grade through her business. At the school, other teachers were also involved in obtaining Christmas for older kids. Some of this, however, wasn't very insightful. One story relates how a church group adopted the seventh grade and got all the kids alarm clocks. This is funny and madly pathetic. Without trying to be political, the reservation seems to me to be a hopeless situation for many kids with the Christmas season, not especially a better chance for happiness than any other part of the year. As a Pod and individually, we were always very generous and a lot more thoughtful.
A couple of years ago other Pod members started to participate more personally and many came out to the reservation. Dick Smith became our resident Santa Claus. This year Lori also somehow coerced Ken Holmes into dressing up in tights and playing the part of an elf. This is funny in that some of us have trouble picturing Ken dressed in tights and frolicking as an elf. Anyway, this past year also brought the announcement of the school's closing and a reduction in staff and in student enrollment. Many of you took this as an opportunity to come visit the school. I hope you all came away with a good memory. If not, then maybe next Christmas at some other place. After all, we still have a perfectly good Santa... and an elf.

## The Chili Frontier Part 2

The date has been set for the cookoff and the charity, identified. Be careful of the charity selected, as you want to stay away from anything that is controversial in the local area. There needs to be a Cookoff

Chairperson selected (from the hosting organization). Try to find a member that is new to the organization. They usually have not been asked to be in charge of anything, and they want to be involved. The new member is enthused about belonging to the organization (if they weren't, they wouldn't have joined). Also, they don't have the "never did things this way before" attitude.

The first task is obtaining prizes for the top 10 CASI chilis, top 3 showmanship teams and the top 3 chilis in the local division. Nice prizes should be obtained, especially for the top 3 chilis, $1^{\text {st }}$ place show and $1^{\text {st }}$ place local. I prefer "merchandise" prizes, because there is no cost involved. Getting nice value prizes is all about being told "NO". If you decide you want first place to be a $\$ 100.00$ item - then it's just a matter of going out and getting it. It is a known fact that if you ask 10 people to do something out of the ordinary, nine will refuse and one will say yes. So apply that theory to getting a $\$ 100$ item - PLAN ON ASKING 10 PEOPLE or MERCHANTS to donate a $\$ 100.00$ item for $1^{\text {st }}$ place chili and one of them will do it. No special skills needed.

You may wonder why 1 get prizes right off the bat it is a simple reason - you can't sell raffle tickets without knowing what the prize for the winners will be. You can't sell a cookoff if you can't tell people what they will win if they enter. Sure you can tell them about the charity for which the cookoff is raising money - but bottom line is people operate on the "what's in it for me" theory. We need to be able to tell them what they can win. When you get that $1^{\text {st }}$ place chili prize, you have a standard to show when you ask for a prize for $2^{\text {nd }}$ place chili and right on down the line.

Another excellent source of prizes is restaurants. They give away free dinners all the time in the papers, coupon books and through other outlets. It's called "buy one dinner and get another dinner of equal or lesser value free"; just change that around a bit. Ask for a couple of free dinners for the cookoff. Make sure you tell them YOU DO NOT WANT A DINNER FOR TWO, you would prefer to have TWO DINNERS FOR ONE because the person that wins will probably have a spouse or friend with them and will pay for one meal. Bingo! You walk away with TWO chili prizes.

Now that you have shown the chairperson how easy this is, turn this person loose and let them go to it. When some good items have been donated, then work can begin on "selling this cookoff" to the organization's membership (or customers) and the public. Darn, now that I think of it, we still don't have any chili cooks, do we? The cookoff is still months away, so we have time to find people to cook chili. Fact is we will start looking a bit in next month's * "Chili Frontier".

The last Saturday in February will bring the Annual Roadrunner Cookoff that Dorathy organizes. As in other years, first place chili will earn a beautiful life size Bronze Roadrunner trophy. The noted artist Lloyd Goldwire sculpted this trophy. The same day there will also be a Bar-B-Que Cookoff following WTBA rules. The Grand Champion BBQ cook will win a similar trophy. Following Carolyn's wishes to help the kids here, the school uses the funds to help pay for field trips. Our field trips tend to be somewhat different from most schools. Early on we realized that we enroll many students who have never seen a McDonald's or a mall or many other places that we take for granted. During their years in school, we try to make certain that every student who graduates understands the pitfalls and pleasures of sit-down restaurants, napkins in laps, tablecloths, etc. that are part of the world "off the border". Consequently, while all of our trips have some curriculum-related activities, we also
have to ensure that the kids visit malls, cafeterias, supermarkets and other places that they must know in order to survive outside of Baja Texas.

So come on out, enjoy Terlingua in February, see the Bluebonnets and birds, and chase that Roadrunner!
